

From the Rector

All my hope on God is founded;
he doth still my trust renew,
me through change and chance he guideth,
only good and only true.
God unknown, he alone
calls my heart to be his own.

Watching the near destruction of Cathédrale Notre-Dame de Paris this past Monday was heartbreaking for people around the world; we can't even begin to imagine what it must have been like for those who are part of the Cathedral community. As those who worship as members of a Parish named in honour of *Notre Dame*, our Lord's beloved mother Mary, I hope that we are praying for all the members of Paris' Cathedral Family.

One of the great architectural achievements of the last millennium, Notre Dame was an incredible blending of technology, science, and art, built to praise and worship the God who inspires wisdom and beauty in all of us. One of the most outstanding examples of a style of architecture that developed within the theological and spiritual life of medieval Europe, a style which some have called the only uniquely Christian style of architecture, Notre Dame has resiliently stood for more than 800 years as a rare symbol of strength, reliability, and stability while revolutions and wars have swirled around it. It has had a justly-deserved and honoured place in the story of human achievement. All of that came under attack this past week; and the loss to all humanity is beyond words. And, in the damage inflicted on a building so long associated with strength and durability, we have once again been reminded of the fragility of our lives, and our symbols.

Pride of man and earthly glory,
sword and crown betray man's trust;
what with care and toil he buildeth,
tower and temple fall to dust.
But God's power, hour by hour,
is my temple and my tower.

In time, Notre Dame will be restored. Mercifully, the extent of the damage was limited by the heroic work of the firefighters; and conversations have already started about what must now be done to repair that damage. The cost will be immense; but there have been other examples in our past where humanity has decided that the end was worth the effort. I think that is safe to save that a fully restored Notre Dame will rise again, although perhaps not for many years.

Daily doth the almighty Giver
bounteous gifts on us bestow;
his desire our soul delighteth,

pleasure leads us where we go.
Love doth stand at God's hand;
joy doth wait on his command.

But when that does happen, whenever that day comes, that will be another example in an endless line of examples of small but vivid witnesses to what the Resurrection of Jesus Christ means in our lives. Every story of rebirth and renewal, every time that a broken relationship is healed, whenever we encounter the power of grace to bring hope in the face of despair and victory in the face of defeat, we are reminded, by analogy, of what the empty tomb and the risen body tell us about God's power and love. Because Jesus has for all time defeated the power of sin and death, because he is risen from the dead, we no longer need to live in fear. Ever.
