From the Rector ———


As we a whole new Church Year let's pretend that the four weeks that lie before us have nothing at all to do with Christmas; or even with getting ready for Christmas. I'm not suggesting that you shouldn't be doing the perfectly good things that you need to do to be ready. I'm just asking you to use your imagination. For just a moment, let's clear away all the stuff about Christmas preparations, because only then will this morning's readings from Holy Scripture begin to make sense. Nothing that we read today spoke of Christ's birth, nor about the prophecy of its expectation. But this morning's readings have a lot to say about how we might prepare for Christ's second coming by cleansing the spiritual temples of our lives, as we hear in this morning Gospel; and, as this morning's Epistle tells us, by ensuring that love is at the centre of all that we do and say.

That's why we hear this morning a Gospel from the Palm Sunday story rather than the Christmas story. Because on the day when Christ entered the city of Jerusalem on the very first Palm Sunday to claim his Kingdom where he would reign only when he'd been lifted up on the cross, he claimed it not by barging into Pilate's office to throw him out, as we might like to do, but by entering the temple and overturning the tables of those who had forgotten what the temple was for. The temple was that place where God had promised to be with his people; to answer their fears and console their hearts; to admonish and to bless. So we hear that story out of order because, at heart, human life is out of order; because we have gotten so wrapped up in other things that we have forgotten what life is really all about; because we have forgotten, each of us at one time or another, to make room in our hearts, and in our lives, for the Christ who comes to us each and every day.

So the Church challenges us, as we begin this Season of Advent, to overturn the tables and clear away the clutter that clogs up our hearts; to make sure that if Christ comes to us as He promised long ago; to mend all that is broken, then we'll be as ready as we possibly can be to meet him. That's what Advent is really all about: about making ready in every part of our lives for the Christ to come to us: this day, as he does every day, by grace; and on the last day in power.

Advent is a precious gift of time to straighten out what's not yet right; to overcome that one struggle, to heal what we've broken, to forgive, to be less addicted, to be more chaste, to be more generous, to bring Christ back into our lives as if this Advent were the last of all Advents. It's a time to interrupt our Christmas marathon and look into our lives to find Christ with us; the Christ who comes to us in the broken places where we know we can't make it on our own; the Christ who comes to us in those moments when we look beyond our own needs, to see the needs of others. To be a Christian is to live each day with hope; to live each day shoulder to shoulder with those who sit in darkness and the shadow of death and to bear their sorrows with them; but also to live all our days in the unshakeable, patient, hope of those who know that the dawn will come one day, even if we don't know when; all the time struggling to be faithful to the Christ who promises to come again by hating less and loving more, by spending less and giving more, by talking less and listening more, by judging less and caring more.
