From the Rector —

The Season of Epiphany is all about revelation: the revelation of the Christ Child to the Gentiles in the visit of the wise men; the revelation of his divine origins to John the Baptist in his baptism in the Jordan River; the revelation of his power to the people of Israel in his miraculous turning of water into wine; the revelation of His compassion in healing the sick and lost.

By revealing so much of Christ's nature and ministry, the Season of Epiphany reminds us of who Jesus was and of what He came to do. It is our connection between the joyful news of his mysterious birth at Christmas and the solemn news of his sacrificial death on Good Friday. Epiphany forces us to reflect more deeply than we might wish to think about the importance and the necessity of Jesus for us and for the world.

But as we reflect about the nature and ministry of Christ at this time of year, we are also challenged to think about Christ's place in our own lives. We are challenged to respond as the wise men responded: to approach him with reverence and worship; and to lay before him gifts which are precious and rare.

We are challenged in the Season of Epiphany to treat Jesus as the wise men treated Jesus, as the King that he truly is; to treat Him as our own king, a king who is deserving of our homage and devotion; a king who is worthy of our obedience and service.

The greatest gift that we'll ever lay before Christ is the gift of perfect loving worship; the kind of worship that starts here in Church but never stops here; the kind of worship which we carry on in everything that we do; which refuses to surrender our thoughts and actions to the cynicism and negativity of our age; the kind of worship that trusts God's love in all things.

The greatest gift that we'll ever offer to Christ is the gift of our own lives, offered freely and willingly with honesty and sincerity; offered with the knowledge that Christ desires to fill all the many parts of our lives with love.

We don't really know what the wise men were doing. We don't really know what their purpose was, or what difference was made in their lives because they had seen the Christ Child. We don't really know what was in their minds as they made that journey to Bethlehem or what was in their minds as they returned home later, wherever home might have been for them.

But we can know, and we can be sure, that Christ can make a great difference in our lives. And we can know, and we can be sure, that honouring him with our lives can change our lives for good. In fact, how we live out our faith, how we worship him on a daily basis, moment by moment, will make all the difference in the world.

When they saw the star, they rejoiced exceedingly with great joy; and going into the house they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they fell down and worshipped him. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts, gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

There's a phrase that I think is helpful to always remember, and it's particularly helpful in Epiphanytide.

If, in our life, Christ is not king of all things, then he's not a king at all; and if Christ is not lord of all of our life, then he's not lord at all.
