From the Rector

Each year on June 22nd the Church commemorates the first known Christian martyr in Britain. His name was Alban and the traditional date of his death is 304, during the persecution under the Emperor Diocletian. He was a pagan serving in the Roman Army who gave shelter to a Christian priest who was fleeing from arrest. Over the next two days the two talked at length and Alban, moved by the man's faith, became a Christian.

The story is told that when soldiers came in search of the priest, Alban met them dressed in the priest's cloak. They mistook him for the priest and arrested him. When given an opportunity, he refused to renounce his new faith, and was beheaded, becoming the first Christian martyr in Britain. It is also said that the second Christian martyr was the executioner who was ordered to kill him; who, when he saw Alban's courage and faith, was so impressed with Alban's testimony that he became a Christian on the spot and refused to kill him; and we are told that the third martyr was the priest; who when he learned that Alban had been arrested in his place, hurried to the court in the hope of saving him by turning himself in.

In addition to giving thanks to God for the faith and courage of Alban and all those who, every day in one corner of the world or another, witness to their hope in Jesus Christ even in the face of persecution and death, we are challenged by the commemoration of St. Alban to ensure that our faith and witness are just as great. Do others see and hear in our actions and words something of the hope that we have in Jesus Christ, a hope that overcomes all worry and fear, even the fear of trial or persecution? Does the love of God, and the power of the Gospel to change hearts and minds, radiant from our lives in ways that invite others to walk with Christ?

At yesterday's meeting of the Altar Guild we recalled the witness of St. Alban; and today I invite your prayers for the people of the two Churches in the Diocese named under the patronage of St. Alban the Martyr: St. Alban's Church in Riverside and St. Alban's Church in Salmon Beach. May we all be inspired to bear witness as St. Alban did so courageously in his own day.

This territory is covered by the "Treaties of Peace and Friendship" which Wəlastəkwiyik (Wolastoqiyik), Mi'kmaq, and Passamaquoddy Peoples first signed with the British Crown in 1726. The treaties did not deal with surrender of lands and resources but in fact recognized Mi'kmaq and Wəlastəkwiyik (Wolastoqiyik) title and established the rules for what was to be an ongoing relationship between nations.
