into Jerusalem riding upon an ass, and to be hailed as King by
the multitude: Increase the faith of those who trust in Thee, and
mercifully hear the prayers of thy supplicants. Let thy manifold
mercies come upon us; and vouchsafe to bless these branches

and crosses of palms, that all who carry them may be filled with
Thy benediction; and grant that as the Hebrew children met the
same Thy Son our Lord Jesus Christ, with branches of palms in
their hands, crying Hosanna in the Highest, so we also, carrying
these emblems, may with good works go forth to meet Christ
and attain to everlasting peace and joy; through the same Jesus
Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Bless and sanctify these branches and crosses of palm, O Lord,
that we who bear them in Thy Name may ever hail Jesus as our
Lord and King, through the same Thy Son Jesus Christ, to whom
with Thee and the Holy Ghost be all honour and glory, world
without end. **Amen.**

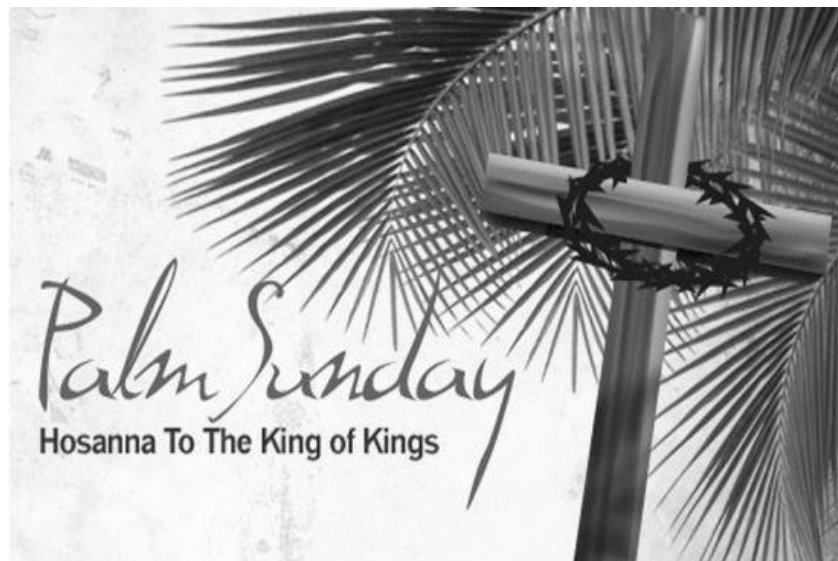

We are at the threshold of our celebration of the paschal mystery of the cross and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. As we enter these days of awe and ponder the mighty sign of love poured out for the world, we are open, as Caiaphas could never be, to the possibility that this story of tragedy and triumph will open our eyes, purify our motives and ambitions, redirect our hungers back to their source in God himself so that the cross may shape our practice of truth, integrity and Christian discipleship. In St. John, the finished work of the cross on the sixth day echoes the finished work of creation in Genesis when 'God saw all that he had made, and behold it was very good'. But now a greater work is here, for in Jesus' cross and crown is love's new creation, the dawning of a new day for us and for our world: sins forgiven, hope restored, our life given back to us once more.

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From the Rector _____

When Jesus was born in Bethlehem, there was no room at the inn. When Jesus died just outside the walls of Jerusalem, there would have been no room at any of the city's inns. It was, as we know, the time of the Passover, and during the preceding week Jewish pilgrims would have made their way to Jerusalem from all over Israel and beyond. In fact, they still do.

We all know that a crowd can be a fickle thing. One minute they're on your side, but at a moment's notice, they can turn against you. People find safety in numbers. They can hide in a crowd. They can behave in ways they would never would when the spotlight is on them.

Our Palm Sunday readings are a fickle set; because they are, at heart, a tale of two crowds. The first crowd is exuberant. At the gates of the city they welcome Jesus - their prophet, their warrior, and their hero. Their cloaks laid down on the ground are like a first century version of the red carpet treatment. In adoration they wave palm branches, signs of welcome and homage, gestures afforded only to a king.

But then there is the second crowd. Assembled in a governor's courtyard, they see things differently. Instead of a king, they now see a criminal. Instead of a leader, they now see a traitor. Instead of shouts of "Hosanna," they now shout for a cross.

Palm Sunday is a tale of two crowds. And we are left to wonder how a people who praise one day can condemn only a few days later.

Palm Sunday and Holy Week bid us to leave behind our preoccupations with the affairs of the world, not to hanker after power or influence – not even power and influence for God himself – but instead to devote ourselves to following the tragic, powerless victim as he treads the path of the Cross, and then to discover, on the other side of his death, his risen power, tragedy defeated and victory achieved.

And that means that you and I must not be part of the rent-a-mob, waving our palms and hoping to hail a political messiah, an economic genius, a military hero. No, we must weave our palms into crosses. And when the crowds on Good Friday pack things up and make their slow journey home, lamenting at the great disappointment this expected deliverer had turned out to be, at the failure he'd proved to be, they must find us there, too. Each one of us, kneeling at the foot of the Cross.

What we will see is very different than what they hoped to see; for, if we have the eyes, we will see the self-offering love of God; the God who rejects hatred and revenge; who knows only mercy and faithfulness; and whose only desire is to be with us in all of life. For the tree of defeat will become the tree of glory; where life is lost, there life will be restored.

For who of us would abandon the king who refuses to abandon us?
